This month we have been doing lots of gardening, looking after the nasturtium, pea, sunflower, potato and strawberry plants. The children also received a new bird feeder and bird bath, with a mini water fountain, which we have hung up. The children have particularly enjoyed the novelty of seeing water come out of the water fountain!



This month we took a trip to Harborne walkway with the toddlers where they enjoyed singing along the woodland path, finding lots of wild garlic and having a stomp around in the pebble stream.

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One of the highlights of this month was World Bee Day. It was wonderful to see so many of the children dressed up. We talked about the life cycle of bees, They had the opportunity to see honeycomb and taste honey. The children also delighted in having a go at painting bees on stones using acrylic paint pens.



Another highlight this month was the arrival of tadpoles from Norfolk Road's pond. Alice and Alison kindly hosted the tadpoles in a mini aquarium for a couple of weeks before they transformed into froglets. We then released them into the pond in Forest School.







How to make a pooter

30 Days Wild!

What you need:

- plasticine 
- jar with lid 
- 40cm of clear, flexible plastic tubing, 7-10cm wide (try a big DIY store) 
- a small piece of gauze, net curtains or tights 
- elastic band 
- green and red stickers or tape 

- 1 Make 2 holes in the lid (ask an adult to help with this) 
- 2 Cut 2 lengths of tubing about 15cm and 25cm long and poke them through the holes. 
- 3 Put the gauze over the end of the shorter tube and mark the other end with a green sticker/tape. 
- 4 Mark the longer tube with a red sticker/tape (red means 'don't suck this tube'). 
- 5 Put some plasticine around the tube holes to make them airtight. 

Now you're ready to pooter!
